PRAY

We pray to you, God the Father of all peoples, you who called your chosen ones out of Egypt, and guided them through the desert with bread from heaven.

Protect the migrant families who are coming to this nation with your mercy. You gave to us your only Son, Jesus the refugee, who preferred the way of the cross above all else, and rose from the tomb, transcending death.

Bring new spiritual life to the migrants on their journey. With Him, you sent the Holy Spirit to accompany us, your children, throughout the whole world and to proclaim justice and mercy for sinners.

Help us every day to welcome those whom you send to us as missionaries.

FAST

On Fridays during Lent, abstain from meat and eat one simple meal of rice and beans to commemorate Christ's fasting in the wilderness and to empathize with the immigrants and refugees coming to our country "hungry" for a safe and dignified life.

ACT

During Lent, serve migrant families at the border and in detention by giving or volunteering to one of the Catholic respite centers on the border, such as **Annunciation house** in El Paso, Texas, **Kino Border Initiative** in Nogales, Arizona. Support refugees from Afghanistan and Ukraine through **Welcome.us**, or **Heartland Alliance**. Speak out in defense of **DACA**, the program for children who were brought here by their migrant parents.

			Ash Wednesday. Begin this Lent with ashes and fasting for the social and personal sins that deny dignity to migrants and refugees. If we are to be "ambassadors of Christ" we must "be reconciled to God." [See 2 Cor 5:20-6:2]	Today's reading has God's people entering a new land. [See Dt 30:15-20] Today's refugees and asylum seekers come from Venezuela, Haiti, Ukraine, and many other countries. This Lent learn their stories: Venezuelan migrants. [See Mt 6:7-15] Are we following God's will on earth as it is in heaven? Speak out to oppose fee increases for immigrant citizenship process. Deadline is March 6! [See Lk4:24] Asylum seekers and refugees flee for their lives too, just like Jesus and the prophets. Reflect on what would make you flee, pray for those who have.	We are here because of our immigrant ancestors. Now, their descendants deny welcome to today's immigrants, just like the ungrateful servant. [See Mt 18:21 - 35] Pray that God opens their hearts and eyes.	"This great nation is truly a wise and intelligent people." [See Dt 4:6] We do not look like a great nation when we refuse to welcome migrants and refugees. Catholic Social Teachings help us live as God's great nation!	"Whoever is not with me is against me,and whoever does not gather with me scatters." [See Lk11:23] Gathering our family ~ immigrants and refugees, DACA children ~ is what God wants us to do! God's promise is guaranteed "not to those who only adhere to the law, but to those who follow the faith." [See Rm4:16] Again, it not the laws that matter to God, but our faith in God's will. Pray for strength to advocate for immigration reform.	"It is the sabbath, and it is not lawful for you to carry your mat." [See Jn 5, 1 - 16] Day three of reflecting on laws vs. faith. Find out what laws are turning away asylum seekers at our borders and what NIJC recommends to repair to the system.	"Some shall come from afar, others from the north and the west," [See Is 49: 8-15] Our nation is filled with migrant journeys over hundreds of years; it is in our DNA. Find out what journey brought you to this country. What laws were in place then.	Moses testifies on behalf of unbelieving people [Ex 32:7-14] and Jesus still faces unbelieving people [Jn 5:31–47]. Receive the sacrament of reconciliation and pray for those who do not recognize Christ in immigrants and refugees seeking asylum. Pray for immigrants who are denied a fair trial, and migrant children who sit in court alone. Support those who defend them as Jesus defended the adulterous woman: Immigration Justice.	Station 3: Jesus falls the first time. Pray for the families of migrants and refugees who suffer violence and instability in their countries of origin. Read their stories and consider what you would do for your family.	Station 4: Jesus meets his grieving mother. Imagine the pain in Mary's heart, yet her faith too. "You will know the truth, and the truth will set you free." [See Jn 8:31] Act for pregnant migrant mothers whose faith in a better life leads them to detention and unsafe health care.	Station 5: Simon helps Jesus carry the cross. In Today's Gospel Jesus challenges those in power, just as DACA and Asylum seekers do. Reflect on how you can be like Simon and take up their cross?	Station 6: Veronica wipes the face of Jesus. The Gospel shows how Jesus is still threatened by unbelieving people. Act as Veronica, believing in the dignity of immigrants by supporting the US Citizenship Act of 2021 any way you can.	Station 7: Jesus falls the second time. Pray for the immigrants and asylum seekers who have arrived in this country, only to be confronted with discrimination, detention, and asylum denial.

Support groups who comfort migrants now, while they are with us, like Interfaith Committee for DI.	Station 9: Jesus falls a third time. In the Gospel Jesus reminds Peter of his upcoming betrayal. Reflect on the endurance of immigrants despite how many times they are betrayed, and immigration reform has failed in this country. Pray for reform.	Station 10: Jesus is stripped of his garments. Migrants are stripped of their dignity and human rights both at home and here in the U.S. Read more about the Transparency and Human Rights Project.	Holy Thursday. Station 11: Jesus is nailed to the cross. Read today's Gospel [Lk 4:16-21]. For his mission statement shared in the temple and living it out he was crucified. Pray for those who crucify our immigrants and refugees?	Good Friday. Station 12: Jesus dies on the cross. Station 13: Jesus is taken down from the cross. How many migrants must die before we welcome them? How many refugees must wait in camps until we open our doors? We are better than this!	Station 14: Jesus in the tomb. The earth becomes a womb for Jesus while the world waits. Refugees and Asylum Seekers wait for us. Pray and advocate for ending all Asylum bans here.
